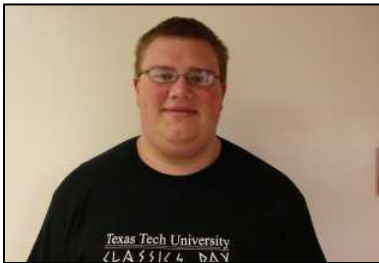
Tobias Schweer comes & goes

Thursday, September 10, Pastor Mike Kauffold came to speak for our chapel service. We started out by singing the songs "Blessed Be the Name of the Lord," "I'll Stand" and, "Mighty to Save." After this, he started his chapel topic. He told us that he wanted us to decide whether we were going to live the rest of the school year for God or for ourselves. The passage of scripture he used was, 1 Timothy 4:12 which says, "Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in life, in love, in faith and in purity." Mr. Kauffold focused on the part that said, "Don't let anyone look down on you...." He went on to explain that this was meant as a gentle command that said, "Live in a way where anyone can respect you no matter what your age may be."

Next he asked us the question, "Have you ever just said something stupid?" Many of us raised our hands. He said that we need to watch our language when we "stub our toe" or in any other case. He also said that we need to be respectful by not talking in class when our teachers are talking. He concluded his first point by stating that the tongue is the hardest thing to control.
