Trimble Remembers Simpler Life By: Mackenzie Teichroew

As a continuation of the centennial interviews, Ross Trimble was chosen next. He was born in 1939 to his parents who had been homesteading in Montana since the spring of 1916. When asked what he remembered while growing up, he spoke of walking to school for three miles uphill. He also said they were one of the first locals to have a wind charger (a windmill that charged car batteries so they could be used to power things such as lights); as a result, they were one of the first families to have electric

lights. Common foods were beef, potatoes, and vegetables from the garden. He said that his most remembered and favorite present he ever got was when David Wall gave him a ride in his airplane for his birthday.

Medical items used when Ross was younger included a common medicine, an anti-septic, called Mercurochrome, which would be used for scrapes or other wounds. The iron lung (a tube which functions as a medical ventilator that enables a person to breathe when the work of breathing

exceeds the person's ability) was a device used during the polio epidemic, which happened when he was young. Sadly, he recalls how one of his friends was put in this device.

On a happier note, he remembers watching the original Snow White and the Seven Dwarves when it first came out in theaters (December, 1937). Also, he saw Roy Rodgers and Rin Tin Tin when theaters still used a projector and outdoor screens. His favorite radio shows as a child were the Sugar Creek Gang and the

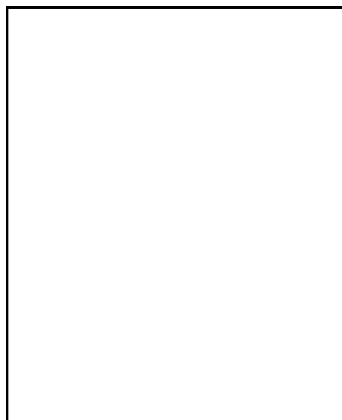
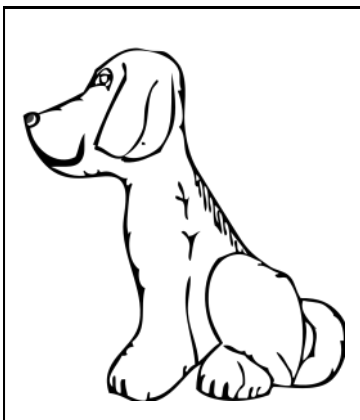

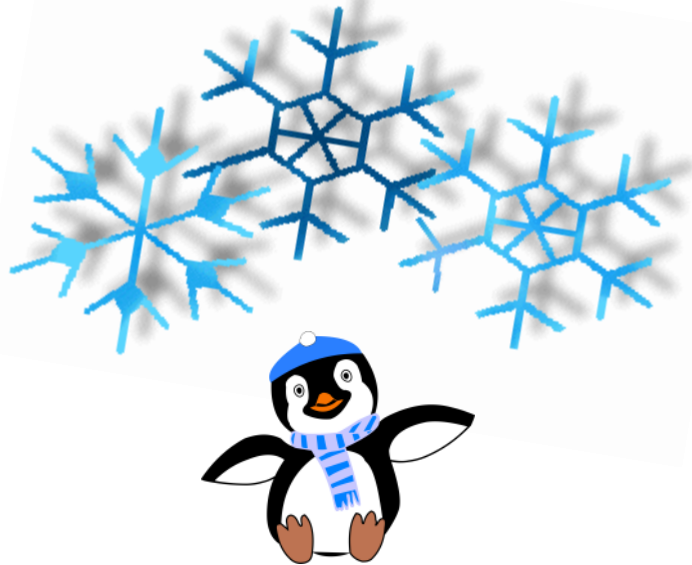
