people giving tithes to the offering. In those times, the offering consisted of two large collection vessels, shaped almost like trumpets, that would make lots of noise as people dropped their coins in. A poor widow who had very little walked up and gave two small copper *lepta*, which amounted to about 1/128th of a laborer's wage. While this was no impressive offering, Jesus makes a point later on that what she gave was worth more than the other offerings. While the poor widow's offering wasn't seen or heard by many people, it was seen by

Jesus, the King of Heaven. Mrs. Andrews drew an analogy between this passage and giving all of what we have to offer up to God. This isn't just in terms of money, but also in our time, efforts, and devotion to Him. Because of what Jesus did on the cross to die for us, we should honestly be inclined to give a little more, even if it's only a small offering in value.

After concluding her section of the chapel, Braeden Toavs introduced himself and told everyone about his story and his involvement in the Marine Corps. He began by talking about how undecided he was about what God had

called him to do. After talking to different people, such as Frank Lenihan, a former Marine and the pastor at the MB church, Braeden decided that God had called him to a rather unorthodox form of ministry in the form of the Marines. Braeden told us how different things were for him during his time in boot camp, and how he saw the depravity in a lot of the men there. By starting a prayer group and inviting other recruits to join, Braeden was able to minister to a lot of individuals there. He finished by speaking about true sacrifice, and being willing to give up things that are important to you

for the sake of building God's kingdom.
